1. Visioning

Do you have a vision statement for your future? Please share it here:

Riverton has created a vision through implementation of various elements of the Master Plan. The vision is to preserve and enhance Riverton's existing historic and residential character through implementation of varied housing types and preservation of natural and cultural features, while strengthening the economy.

If so, when was it last affirmed? 2018

Through what process?

In March of 2018, the community undertook a Reexamination Report with the assistance of the BCBC and their planner. As part of that report, a Community Planning survey sought residents' input regarding (1) open space, parks, and recreation; (2) environmental issues; (3) the built environment; (4) circulation; (5) economic development and business environment; (6) home occupations; (7) historic preservation; and (8) borough communications.

Who participated?

The survey was available to the entire community.

What matters most to your community?

The public impression of the community is positive and validates the initiatives reflected by the goals and objectives.

The public vision for parks and recreation includes maintaining shade and street trees, implementation of street furnishings such as bicycle racks and trash and recycling stations and improving access to the Pompeston Creek and Delaware River at the end of public streets. Needs set forth by the public include a dog park (which has already been opened), neighborhood pocket parks, walking paths and trails, and a public canoe and kayak launch.

Existing community events, such as the Fourth of July celebration, were cited as beneficial and expansion of other community events, such as farmers' markets, festivals, and food truck nights, should be used to enhance community pride and improve the business climate.

Environmental issues included recycling, trash and litter removal, water quality, water conservation, and tree planting and maintenance. Riverton is a longtime member of Tree City USA and is starting to participate in Sustainable Jersey. There is a large part of our community that is concerned with climate issues and habitat loss and what we can do as a community to timely address those issues.

Issues relating to the built environment include limitation of front yard fences. The majority of respondents to our 2018 survey had no concerns regarding traffic on Main Street, although some residents expressed concerns with excessive speed on Main Street. Many residents expressed concerns with traffic on Broad Street, requesting enhanced pedestrian and traffic lights at the rail crossings (which have been received), as well as vehicle speed and the failure of drivers to stop for pedestrians or oncoming trains.

Respondents favored permitting breweries and beer (Riverton has a brewery ordinance), and believed that wine, and liquor sales would improve the business climate, despite the fact that Riverton remains a dry town. Other residents supported tax abatements or similar methods to enhance the business climate. Discussions continue regarding appropriate businesses for the commercial areas, as well as the expansion of permitted home occupations with limitations upon visitors and activity, something that received more attention during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Current historic preservation controls on construction and improvements to property was cited by a majority of residents as sufficient, while other residents opined that more stringent controls would preserve the historic nature of Riverton and ensure more consistent design elements throughout the town.

Finally, a majority of residents believe that social media should be used to communicate with the public, while a substantial number of respondents suggested that the Borough website, social media, print media, and signs should all be utilized to promote Riverton to residents and non-residents alike.

Have you thought about your sustainability? Your contributions to Green House Gases (GHG)? How to reduce your GHG contributions?

No. But we should think about this and have a plan. Borough Council has passed a few resolutions from as provided by Sustainable Jersey, and Riverton could build upon those resolutions.

2. Resiliency

Have you started planning for resiliency to climate change and sea level rise? NO. However, as a riverfront town with a large creek on one side, a small run near our border with Cinnaminson and another creek not far away and with water tables rising, particularly near Linden Avenue, and with new flooding near Harrison Street, it might be a good plan to have some discussions and a vision for how we respond to changes in climate and water level rise.

Who has been engaged in the discussions? Participants in those discussion could include the governing body, Planning Board, the Environmental Commission, the Borough Green Team, and the Pompeston Watershed Group.

Have you identified your risks? (Flooding? Erosion? Heat island effect? Increased storms? Disease? Other? What's the status of the county HMP? Flooding and erosion are risks particularly

along Jack's Run and the Pompeston Creek. There are ways to respond with native plantings to better hold creek banks in times of strong high waters and overworked storm drains.

Have you assessed vulnerable populations? NO?

Sormwwater management ordinances have been adopted.

3. Equity

Neither environmental justice nor equity appear to be issues within Riverton.

What is the status of your affordable housing agreement? And, the status of implementation?

The 2019 Housing Plan and 2020 Settlement Agreement, as well as the 2018 Master Plan Reexamination Report, resulted in the implementation of ordinances as well as physical improvements. The Borough is located within the Metropolitan Planning Area and is participating in the Municipal Plan Endorsement process. The housing ordinances have been implemented consistent with the Housing Plan and Settlement Agreement, and the last remaining detail is the production of an Existing Land Use Map and revised Land Use Plan Map to implement zone map changes precipitated by the Housing Plan and Settlement Agreement. The Housing Plan seeks to promote equity and inclusion, consistent with municipal and state plan policy goals and objectives.

4. Community Characterization

If not identified in the earlier questions, what are the key elements that define your community?

Riverton Borough is framed by the Delaware River and the Pompeston Creek to the north and northeast; Cinnaminson Township to the north, east, and south; and Palmyra to the southwest. The town is bisected into quadrants at the intersection of the rail line and Broad Street with Main Street. The town is one part of a series of communities dotting the Delaware waterfront within Burlington County with views of Pennsylvania beyond the river. The Borough of Riverton was formed after 1851 by Philadelphians eager to escape the summer city heat via ferry initially and later by train. A notable Philadelphia architect, Samuel Sloan, generated a master plan and designed quite a few homes in the community, as well as the ferryboat landing and train station. The plan included a Delaware River waterfront park to provide physical access to the river; and deed restrictions regulating porches and fences to enhance residents visual access to the waterfront.

Riverton is a small, pedestrian friendly town committed to historic preservation, tree-lined streets, community pride and involvement.
