Nature Neighbors—Q&A

This month, Nature Neighbors is featuring Kim Piotrowski, a Green Team member.

Nature Neighbors: How did you first get involved with the Riverton Environmental Commission (EC) and/or Green Team?

Kim: A few years ago, along with the overall buzz about the climate crisis, I kept hearing about the decline of birds and insects specifically and was really troubled by this. Around that same time, I learned about Doug Tallamy's books (*Nature's Best Hope*, in particular), and became really interested in the concept of each house doing a little something to help even if it's just a single flowerpot with a beneficial plant on your porch. Another impetus for joining was that I wanted to have a voice and find others in Riverton with similar interests and concerns. I have been really passionate about helping generate awareness; again, even if it's just about making one small change to one's normal routine.

Nature Neighbors: What is your favorite natural spot or feature in Riverton?

Kim: Like many people, I see my own backyard as a sanctuary. Not only for me, but for our local wildlife! We have a small screened-in porch where I often sit and observe hawks, crows, songbirds, squirrels, and other critters going about their day. I can also hear a tree frog and screech owl at certain times of the year. Similarly, I like to watch the various mosses, plants, shrubs, and trees morph and change while maintaining the garden as the seasons change. As a photographer, I am always taking pictures of some interesting detail that wasn't there just days or weeks prior.

Nature Neighbors: What actions do you take at home to help the environment?

Kim: I learned about the benefits of native plants for birds and insects (again, from the Doug Tallamy book along with various online groups). I sought out and started to introduce <u>native plants</u> into our backyard whenever I had a spot available. Secondly, our household does a lot of recycling for anything that can be separated, and a lot of composting for any plant-based kitchen waste. <u>With a compost heap</u>, I have found that it is totally unnecessary to put our regular garbage can out every week. We only have a full can of actual garbage about every 4-6 weeks. Plus, compost also helps put nutrients back into the soil for the garden beds rather than buying mulch or introducing expensive treatments.

Nature Neighbors: What steps do you think anyone can take to be greener?

Kim: Come to some of our meetings (second Mondays, 7:30PM, at the Porch Club)! We are doing our best to make education (including guest speakers) and participating in more local events (like Food Truck Night) a big part of what we do. Lots of people come with great questions and ideas too. I have learned so much from the knowledge and wisdom of other team members and attendees over the last couple of years.

Nature Neighbors: What sustainability or environmental initiative have you seen other municipalities that you think would be great idea for Riverton to consider adopting or promoting?

Kim: I would like to see (and hear!) less of the <u>intense and unnecessary gasoline-powered leaf blowers, lawn mowers, and similar landscaping tools</u>. Merchantville, Maplewood, Montclair, West Orange, and Princeton are some of the New Jersey municipalities that have implemented seasonal bans, are having valuable community discussions about alternative practices for the future, and/or are offering incentives to help individuals and businesses get started with electric equipment for property maintenance which are far less polluting and noisy for other residents.
